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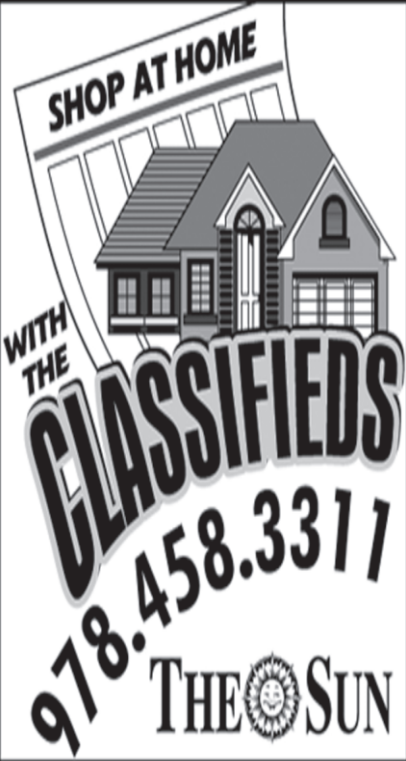

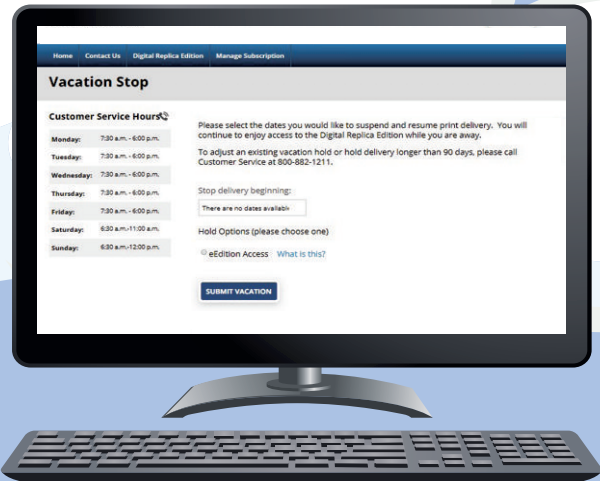

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PHARMACIES ALLEGEDLY FILLED INVALID PRESCRIPTIONS

Feds sue Walmart over opioid crisis

WASHINGTON » The Justice Department sued Walmart on Tuesday, accusing it of fueling the nation's opioid crisis by pressuring its pharmacies to fill even potentially suspicious prescriptions for the powerful painkillers.

The civil complaint filed Tuesday points to the role Walmart's pharmacies may have played in the crisis by filling opioid prescriptions and by unlawfully distributing controlled substances to the pharmacies during the height of the opioid crisis.

Walmart operates more than 5,000 pharmacies in its stores around the country. The Justice Department alleges Walmart violated federal law by selling thousands of prescriptions for controlled substances that its

pharmacists "knew were invalid," said Jeffrey Clark, the acting assistant attorney general in charge of the Justice Department's civil division.

Federal law required Walmart to spot suspicious orders for controlled substances and report those to the Drug Enforcement Administration, but prosecutors charge the company didn't do that.

"Walmart knew that its distribution centers were using an inadequate system for detecting and reporting suspicious orders," said Jason Dunn, the U.S. attorney in Colorado.

"As a result of this inadequate system, for years Walmart reported virtually no suspicious orders at all. In other words, Walmart's pharmacies ordered opioids in a way that went essentially unmonitored and unregulated."

The 160-page suit alleges that Walmart made it difficult for its pharmacists to follow the rules, putting "enormous pressure" on them to fill a high volume of prescriptions as fast as possible, while at the same time denying them the authority to categorically refuse to fill prescriptions issued by prescribers the pharmacists knew were continually issuing invalid invalid prescriptions.

Walmart fought back in an emailed statement to The Associated Press, saying that the Justice Department's investigation is "tainted by historical ethics violations."

It said the "lawsuit invents a legal theory that unlawfully forces pharmacists to come between patients and their doctors, and is riddled with factual inaccuracies and cherry-picked documents taken out of context."

School Department to pay its bills on time.

"Is it carelessness? Is it laziness? Is it lack of training?" Councilor Daniel Rourke said. "Why does this keep happening to the School Department?"

Because the "bad bills" were from fiscal year 2020, which ended June 30, the School Department needs a two-thirds vote of approval from the City Council to pay the bills from its current fiscal 2021 funds.

"Please note that most of these bills arrived after the cutoff point from City Hall despite our reminders to school staff and notice to vendors to submit all of their invoices in a timely fashion," school Assistant Superintendent of Finance Billie Jo Turner wrote in a memo to city Chief Financial Officer Conor

Baldwin. "We are unaware of any additional outstanding invoices or bills."

In October 2019, the council approved the School Department's request for \$51,000 in late bills, Baldwin said.

Councilor Rodney Elliott said he would not support paying the late bills due to the School Department's broken promises that it wouldn't happen again.

"We've had a number of subcommittee meetings on this, and we've been assured that the last time was going to be the last time," he said.

Elliott said he recognized that bills such as the nearly \$4,600 invoice from Westford Public Schools for transportation services that wasn't received until the end of September wasn't the School Department's fault, but the overall pattern of late bills has been going on for too many years.

He said the city auditor does her job as required by law and

doesn't continue spending after the end of the fiscal year, and everybody else in the city government has to abide by purchase and procurement regulations. Elliott said it doesn't make any sense that the council continues to see these bad bills from the School Department.

"The question is, when is it going to stop?" said Councilor Vesna Nuon.

Nuon said he was tempted to vote against the bills to send a message to the School Department, but was more concerned that not paying the bills now would only lead to lawsuits and having to expend additional resources later. He also wondered how the vendors could wait this long to be paid. In order to prevent this from occurring in the future, Baldwin said better communication between the central business office and the school sites would be helpful, along with repetition and training.

"I think that we all under-

stand that some things became more difficult this year because of COVID and because some of the school sites were closed, but the city side has to go through the same process every year," Baldwin said. "The auditor sends out a communication, and all the departments, even the offsite departments that are not here in City Hall, have to have all of their paperwork into the auditor's office by the deadlines."

Councilor Dave Conway said he thought when the council discussed the matter last year, that they requested the city and school financial leaders meet on a regular basis so the problem wouldn't persist. Last year, he said, the problem was blamed on the former superintendent.

"Well, the former superintendent is not here today, so I don't know who we're going to blame it on now," Conway said. "But the fact is, we cannot keep on doing this and working like this — it's working sloppy, that's what it is."

As a former principal, Councilor Bill Samaras said when then-Superintendent George Tsapatsaris encountered a period of late bills, Tsapatsaris wasn't afraid to place the blame on the individuals who didn't follow the proper procedures rather than letting the School Department as a whole take responsibility. All of the principals had to listen to what was expected of them and meet the appropriate timelines, Samaras said.

Councilor Rita Mercier said she had been in touch with another vendor in the city that was still waiting to be paid and had spoken with Turner to make sure it was addressed. However, that vendor and amount were missing from the School Department's request, Mercier said.

The council ultimately voted to table the bills until more information and any other potential outstanding bills could be obtained from the School Department.

fortunately, I think people who are struggling the most were people who were struggling before."
